Create a Leaf Rubbing

Supplies :

Leaves

Paper - this should be lightweight

Crayons

Create beautiful artwork with leaves from your walk.

Step 1: Go for a walk. Collect leaves of various shapes and sizes. You can use fresh or dried fallen ones.

Step 2: Position a leaf on a flat surface with bottom side facing up.

Step 3: Put a sheet of paper over the leaf.

Step 4: Rub the side of a crayon on the area over the leaf. As you do this, you'll see the colored areas start to take the shape of the leaf. Continue until you've rubbed over the entire leaf.

Step 5: Remove the leaf from under the paper. You can add more leaf rubbings using other colors and shapes.
